6. You must display photographic ID indicating medical student status in clinical and University environments and always

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of your educational supervisor(s) and within the remit and competencies of a medical student.

7. You must
having your face visible and being bare below the elbow.
8. You must complete your Disclosure and Barring Service and Occupational Health clearances in Year 1 before your first placement involving patient contact.
9. You must maintain your Fit for Course health clearance status and inform the Medical School if there is any significant change to your health that might affect your health clearance or fitness to practise. It is your responsibility to recognise when you are ill, to seek medical advice, to accept appropriate treatment, and to recognise when your fitness for clinical work is or could be impaired.
10. You must keep your immunisations up-to-date and inform the Medical School of any new exposure to, or infection with, blood borne viruses which might affect your clearance to undertake Exposure Prone Procedures (EPPs) which carry a risk of transmission of these viruses. If you are not cleared for EPPs, you must carry a student support card and present this to your clinical supervisors and you must not perform or assist in certain surgical procedures e.g. in Obstetrics and Orthopaedic surgery.
11. You must complete required mandatory training during the Introductory and Orientation Modules and attend Trust and placement inductions and you must
